



Shades of Death: The Gauntlet Runner Book II by Stephen Bailey. (Sequel to the author's The Gauntlet Runner book). **AUTHOR SIGNING June 14 & 15 at HMTA**

With the events of the past year freshly engraved in his mind, Jacob Murray lies in wait, just a stone's throw from a French outpost in the midst of the western Pennsylvania wilderness. Having teamed up with the two young men who helped his wife escape her

Huron captors, he waits for any sign of Maggie or the French merchant who purchased her. A straightforward plan for ambush soon goes awry and Jacob and Joshua are separated from Maggie and One-Ear; the latter pair heads towards Canada, the former for Fort Duquesne.

While Maggie's efforts to escape and avoid French captivity lead to unexpected encounters with the native tribes of New York and Canada, including the great Ottawa leader Pontiac, Jacob himself is taken captive by the French. With Joshua's help, he is able to escape, but life as a deserter is very dangerous, especially when the British army is amassing nearby, under the watchful eye of Major General Edward Braddock. The Murrays long for their peaceful life on the homestead in Pennsylvania, but with two great countries and their native allies battling over the Ohio Valley, their wishes must remain ungranted...at least for now."

A Demand of Blood: The Cherokee War of 1776

by Nadia Dean. Most Americans understand the Revolutionary War was fought in defense of human rights and has since been celebrated on the ideals of conquest over tyranny. The conquerors, it is said, are those who record the history we inherit. What we weren't told, until now, is how the Revolution played out in the backcountry between Cherokees and colonials. Using first-hand accounts from British




Indian agents, Cherokee headmen, and colonial militia, A Demand of Blood presents a war fought in the shadows of the American Revolution.

Decades of tension between the Cherokee Indians and frontier settlers exploded in the year that marked American independence: 1776. As southern colonists prepared to fight Britain, Cherokee warriors stepped up their struggle for sovereignty. Dragging Canoe, the charismatic Cherokee war leader and staunch British ally, waged guerilla warfare throughout the southern colonies in an effort to regain control over native hunting grounds. In retaliation, colonial powers sent 6,000 militiamen into Cherokee country to destroy towns and crops.

This is the saga of two separate, simultaneous wars. It depicts the courage, betrayal, honor, and sacrifice of each side of the conflict. Based on extensive historical research, A Demand of Blood uncovers for the first time the story of the Cherokee's war for independence and reveals the struggle at the heart of all humanity: the quest for freedom.

The First Frontier: The Forgotten History of Struggle, Savagery, and Endurance in Early America by Scott Weidensaul. An exploration of some of the most turbulent, fascinating years in American history: the 16th century into the mid-18th century in eastern North America.



The First Frontier traces two and a half centuries of history through poignant, mostly unheralded

personal stories—like that of a Harvard-educated Indian caught up in seventeenth-century civil warfare, a mixed-blood interpreter trying to straddle his white and Native heritage, and a Puritan woman wielding a scalping knife whose bloody deeds still resonate uneasily today. It is the first book in years to paint a sweeping picture of the Eastern frontier, combining vivid storytelling with the latest research to bring to life modern America's tumultuous, uncertain beginnings.
