A tour advanced age(s), it takes a lot of preparation to make sure we have all the necessities for a lengthy stay. Mom (Grammy) needs puzzles, her music, books and writing supplies. Dad (Pappy) needs a minimum of one box truck load of fly fishing gear: rods, reels, flies, leaders, waders and hip boots, proper clothing for the various weather conditions, camera, night fishing lights, etc. etc. Pretty much something from every other page in his fishing catalogs. And I'm not talking about just one or two catalogs folks! This is a serious addiction for which there is no cold turkey solution. He's in this for the duration.

Treally do enjoy fishing with him, just like my predecessors Nelson and Logan did. Between us three dogs, we've had over 30 years of poking around every special part of this section of PA. 

Opening night is your opportunity to view and/or acquire the newest artwork created specifically for the show. The show is open again on Saturday and Sunday, but this remains your first chance for the art, all the while enjoying fine hors d'oeuvres, wine and other thirst quenchers.

Along with the bronze sculpture and accoutrements, most of the original paintings on opening night will be available for purchase on a first come, first serve basis. Other paintings will be offered on a draw system. In the draw system, interested buyers are asked to complete an "intent to purchase" form, and if more than one buyer is interested in a particular painting, the names will be drawn and the first name drawn will be given the opportunity to purchase said painting. Painting prices are fixed - this is not a bidding system. Absentee purchasing/intent to purchase is accepted. <u>Saturday 11:00 am: KYLE CARROLL</u> History on canvas: The Stories behind the Paintings:

Have you ever wondered how ideas become paintings? Historical artist Kyle Carroll discusses the process of how historical paintings are envisioned, researched, constructed and finally rendered on canvas in this presentation. Artists are required to make many decisions as they work their way from inspiration to finished product. Come listen to the stories behind the paintings and experience the joys and challenges of capturing the spirit of frontier America with pencil and paint.

<u>Saturday 12:30 pm: ELIOT PATTISON</u> Finding our roots in the Historical Novel:

Author Eliot Pattison will emphasize the vital role that art in all its forms plays in keeping history alive and reconnecting Americans with their roots. Pattison will share his passion for bringing history to life through the historical novel, and explain how the years of the mid-18th century, the period of his acclaimed Bone Rattler series, turned European "colonists" into "Americans" who were primed for rebellion.

Mr. Pattison's presentation will conclude with a question and answer session followed by a book signing in the ballroom.

<u>Saturday 2:00 pm: JOHN BARRETT</u> The Evolution of Accourrements through the 18th and 19th centuries:

John Barrett will share his observations of the stylistic and architectural progression of accourrements through the 18th and 19th centuries. He will discuss the use of period materials, varying construction methods and design work, and how particular 18th century craftsmen have influenced his own unique style of artwork.

Saturday 3:30 pm: JONATHAN STASKO Changing Lives Through Art:

Explore the transforming and transferring power of inspiration. Artist Jonathan Stasko shares a story about a collective effort to bring a Ugandan orphanage life-giving water. From a girl cradling a baby plagued by malaria, to a national award for Jonathan's painting "Pure Religion Is This", follow this journey giving the gift of hope through art.

All presentations are free and will be held in the second floor lecture room in the HMTA ballroom building. Schedules and topics are subject to change.




















On the Bookshelf

<u>Blood of the Oak</u> by Eliot Pattison. **AUTHOR SIGNING and PRESENTATION June 11 at HMTA (see schedule on page 3)**



This is the fourth book in author Eliot Pattison's Bone Rattler series of historical novels. In *Blood of the Oak*, the protagonist Duncan McCallum advances to 1765 and into the throes of the Stamp Tax dissent, which marked the beginning of organized resistance to English rule. Duncan follows ritualistic murders that are strangely connected to both the theft of an Iroquois artifact and a series of murders and kidnappings in the network of secret runners supporting the nascent committees of correspondence—which are engaged in the first organized political dissent across colonial borders. He encounters a powerful

conspiracy of highly placed English aristocrats who are bent on crushing all dissent, is captured by its agents, and sent into slavery in Virginia beside the kidnapped runners. Inspired by an aged native American slave and new African friends, Duncan decides not just to escape but to turn their own intrigue against the London lords.

Included in the novel's cast of characters are figures from our history who have their own destinies to fulfill in the next decade, including Benjamin Franklin (writing from London), Samuel Adams, the early Pennsylvania rebel James Smith, Dr. Benjamin Rush, and, very briefly, a soft spoken militia officer named Washington. Blood of the Oak takes a fresh view on the birth of the new American nation, suggesting that the "freedom" that became the centerpiece of the Revolution was uniquely American, rising not just from unprecedented political discourse but also from the extraordinary bond with the natural world experienced by frontier settlers and native tribes.

<u>Blind Faith: Gauntlet Runner series book VI</u> by S. Thomas Bailey.

Blind Faith is the sixth book in award winning author S. Thomas Bailey's Gauntlet Runner series of historical novels.

Enemies come in many forms, and they are not always what you think. Jacob Murray has learned that lesson, but it haunts him once again. The tides of the war have finally changed and the British are beginning to gain ground over their French adversaries. The French sit within the


walled city of Quebec, waiting for their enemy.

Jacob and Maggie are still apart, separated by thousands of miles of unfamiliar wilderness. Despite this adversity, they each seek a way to find what remains of their family. Faced with her own challenges, Maggie finds unlikely friendship and assistance from what she believed were her enemies. Following an opportunity to track down her son, she journeys to Quebec City, where she finds a city preparing for a siege from the British army, who are determined to end the war. Jacob faces his own challenges, and finds he is often forced to fight not only his enemies, but also those who should be his allies. Blind Faith tells the story of deserters, a country controlled by the church, and the walled city that holds many secrets.

Braddock's Defeat: The Battle of the Monongahela and the Road to Revolution by David Preston.

David Preston's gripping account of Braddock's Defeat, also known as the Battle of the Monongahela, is the most authoritative ever written. Using untapped sources and collections, Preston offers a reinterpretation of Braddock's Expedition in 1754 and 1755, one that does full justice to its remarkable achievements. Braddock had rapidly advanced his army to the cusp of victory, overcoming uncooperative colonial governments and seemingly

insurmountable logistical challenges while managing to carve a road through the formidable Appalachian Mountains.

Preston's work challenges the stale portrait of an arrogant European officer who refused to adapt to military and political conditions in the New World and the first to show fully how the French and Indian coalition achieved victory through effective diplomacy, tactics, and leadership. New documents reveal that the French Canadian commander, a seasoned veteran named Captain Beaujeu, planned the attack on the British column with great skill, and that his Native allies were more disciplined than the British regulars on the field.

The Victory with No Name: The Native

American Defeat of the First American Army
by Colin Calloway.

In 1791, General Arthur St. Clair led the United States army in a campaign to destroy a complex of Indian villages at the Maumee River in northwestern Ohio. Almost within reach of their objective, St. Clair's 1,400 men were attacked by about one thousand Indians. The U.S. force was decimated, suffering nearly one thousand casualties in killed and

wounded, while Indian casualties numbered only a few dozen. But despite the lopsided result, it wouldn't appear to carry much significance; it involved only a few thousand people, lasted less than three hours, and the outcome, which was never in doubt, was permanently reversed a mere three years later.

Yet, as renowned Native American historian Colin Calloway demonstrates here, St. Clair's Defeat--as it came to be known-- was hugely important for its time. An engaging and enlightening read for American history enthusiasts and scholars alike, The Victory with No Name brings this significant moment in American history back to light.


